SUPERVISOR MOORE

Is there anybody here tonight that would like to speak on any Agenda items? Yes, sir.

*(Unidentified from audience, "I'd like to speak, but I'd like to speak later.")*

COUNCILMAN PAGE

Later?

*(Unidentified from audience, "I don't want to speak now, I want to speak later.")*

COUNCILMAN PAGE

Okay.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Well if it's an Agenda item, this is the time in which you have to speak, sir. If it's on the Agenda, you can speak now. There will be a public comment section later.

*(Unidentified from audience, "Okay, I'll sit. I'll wait.")*

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Okay. The first Public Hearing we have tonight, well we have to approve the Minutes first, I'm sorry. Could I have the approval of the May 7, 2014 Minutes, please?

COUNCILWOMAN ZINCK

Mr. Supervisor, I'd like to approve the Minutes of the May 7, 2014 Meeting.

COUNCILMAN PAGE

Second.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Discussion? Please call the roll.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

We have two (2) Public Hearings tonight. The first one we'll have is on the transfer of facilities to Monroe County's Irondequoit Bay South Central Pure Waters District. And if our Town Engineer is here, maybe you can come and explain the project, please.

CHRIS MARTIN, DIRECTOR OF ENGINEERING & PLANNING

Good evening. For the Record, my name is Chris Martin, I'm the Director of Engineering & Planning for the Town of Henrietta. If you don't mind, I'll swivel around a little bit. Basically, what this Application or this Resolution or Public Hearing is going to do is there's four (4) items right now that the Monroe County Pure Waters takes care of and there was an agreement back in 1975 that authorized all this. It's basically some housekeeping items. It was never, these items were never formally transferred over to the, from Henrietta to Monroe County Pure Waters, so what this Public Hearing will do and Resolution will transfer these things over. Just to give you a quick list, one is the Pump Station over at John Street near RIT. Another one is a Trunk Sewer along East River Road that goes down to Riverton. The other one is Pinnacle Road Pump Station. And then the fourth (4<sup>th</sup>) item is the Red Creek Trunk Sewer east of the Lehigh Valley Railroad. So that's pretty much it in a nutshell.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Okay, thank you, Chris.

CHRIS MARTIN, DIRECTOR OF ENGINEERING & PLANNING

You're welcome.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Anybody who would like to speak on this issue?

*(Away from microphone, Goodman Freed, 167 Bennington Hills Court, "I have a question.")*

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Yes, sir, you have to come to the microphone. We need your name and address, please.

GOODMAN FREED, 167 BENNINGTON HILLS COURT

Goodman Freed, 167 Bennington Hills Court, West Henrietta. You're transferring all these facilities, what happens to the jobs of the people that work in these facilities?

CHRIS MARTIN, DIRECTOR OF ENGINEERING & PLANNING

Again, Chris Martin, Director of Engineering & Planning, basically right now Monroe County Pure Waters own, well, they don't own it, but they run all this anyway. So there's no job loss.

GOODMAN FREED, 167 BENNINGTON HILLS COURT

No job loss, okay, that's all *(inaudible)*.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Is there anybody else that would like to speak? *(Pause, no response)* I'll close this Public Hearing at this time. The second Public Hearing is Proposed Law No. 1 of 2014, a Local Law to Amend Henrietta Code Chapter 109 Entitled "Ethics". And if there's anybody that would like to speak on this issue, please come forward.

*(Away from microphone, Goodman Freed, 167 Bennington Hills Court, "What is the proposal?")*

SUPERVISOR MOORE

It's a Code of Ethics for all elected officials and Town employees.

*(Away from microphone, Goodman Freed, 167 Bennington Hills Court, "What does it say?")*

SUPERVISOR MOORE

It's been posted and it's a document that's about six (6) pages long I think. It's an Ethics Policy that most anybody in any town adopts and we were asked by the Attorney General at our audit report that was delivered on the 29<sup>th</sup> of January to adopt such a Code.

COUNCILMAN MULLIGAN

We've never had a Code of Ethics before, so we're doing this at the direction of the Attorney General.

*(Away from microphone, Goodman Freed, 167 Bennington Hills Court, "You have an Ethics Board that's recently been created.")*

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Sir, you have to come to the microphone.

GOODMAN FREED, 167 BENNINGTON HILLS COURT

Excuse me, Goodman Freed, 167 Bennington Hills Court, West Henrietta. You have recently created an Ethics Board. We don't know who they are, okay. And you, and they're not listed anywhere. Your Ethics, what you're reading, what you have, those six (6) pages, I went online and I looked for that. I couldn't find it online. There's a lot of stuff, there are a lot of things that are not online from the Town rules and regulations, your job isn't even on there. I tried to find out what you're supposed to, what you're here to do, and what your parameters of your job are. It's not on, they're not on the, in the rules. So there's a lot of information that we're not getting, so for you to propose rules of ethics that we don't know what you're proposing, we would like to see what you're proposing and how they affect the people in the Town and how they affect the people that work for the Town and how they affect you and your Board.

COUNCILMAN PAGE

If I could..

GOODMAN FREED, 167 BENNINGTON HILLS COURT

Yes, you could.

COUNCILMAN PAGE

This isn't any clandestine Resolution. It's a state statute that mandates that each Town have an Ethics Policy.

GOODMAN FREED, 167 BENNINGTON HILLS COURT

Fine.

COUNCILMAN PAGE

We were lax in not having it before. It's pretty much boiler plate. It's approved by attorneys and state legislators at the state level and it basically, and if I, correct me if I'm wrong. I think we passed a Resolution a meeting or two (2) ago that named the Ethics Board and their names and addresses into the Record, so that took place before. What we're doing is we're having a Public Hearing so that you can review what's on it and if there's any questions you might have.

GOODMAN FREED, 167 BENNINGTON HILLS COURT

Well these are the questions. The questions are who's on the Board and...

SUPERVISOR MOORE

But sir, this is online.

GOODMAN FREED, 167 BENNINGTON HILLS COURT

Okay.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

And it also was posted outside and has been. And we had a Workshop session on Monday and it was posted then too. I have nothing to hide.

GOODMAN FREED, 167 BENNINGTON HILLS COURT

Well we would like to know before...

SUPERVISOR MOORE

I know but...

GOODMAN FREED, 167 BENNINGTON HILLS COURT

...before you pass something that may affect people that, negatively that are working in jobs and...

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Why would you think ethics would be negative?

GOODMAN FREED, 167 BENNINGTON HILLS COURT

Because I've been living in the state for a long time and I've been involved with politics a long time and politics is unethical for the most part.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Well how about if we never had a policy before and now we're adopting one...

GOODMAN FREED, 167 BENNINGTON HILLS COURT

Okay...

SUPERVISOR MOORE

...does that say anything?

GOODMAN FREED, 167 BENNINGTON HILLS COURT

Yes, it says that the people should know what the policy is.

COUNCILWOMAN ZINCK

Can I...

DANIEL MASTRELLA, TOWN ATTORNEY

Mr. Supervisor, may I just...

COUNCILWOMAN ZINCK

Yes.

DANIEL MASTRELLA, TOWN ATTORNEY

...intercede just to correct a misstatement made earlier. We do have an Ethics Policy.

It is in our Town Code at present and the proposal tonight is to revise and update it. It was, the ethics, the Code of Ethics that's in our present Code was passed in 1970.

GOODMAN FREED, 167 BENNINGTON HILLS COURT

I tried to read it online sir and it wasn't there.

DANIEL MASTRELLA, TOWN ATTORNEY

If you looked you could go to the link for the Town Code...

GOODMAN FREED, 167 BENNINGTON HILLS COURT

I did.

DANIEL MASTRELLA, TOWN ATTORNEY

...and it's Chapter 109 of the Town Code.

GOODMAN FREED, 167 BENNINGTON HILLS COURT

109 (*inaudible*), is that the one you're talking about?

DANIEL MASTRELLA, TOWN ATTORNEY

Chapter 109.

GOODMAN FREED, 167 BENNINGTON HILLS COURT

109, 109-3 (E)and (F).

DANIEL MASTRELLA, TOWN ATTORNEY

It's the whole 109 is the Code of Ethics, Chapter 109 is the present Code of Ethics and what's proposed tonight is certainly in tune, but it significantly updates it. It applies to Town employees.

GOODMAN FREED, 167 BENNINGTON HILLS COURT

I understand what it applies...

DANIEL MASTRELLA, TOWN ATTORNEY

And it is posted at the Clerk's Office. I haven't checked to see if what the proposed law for tonight is online, but it's not going to be acted on tonight in any event, so you'll be able to review it prior to any action by the Board.

GOODMAN FREED, 167 BENNINGTON HILLS COURT

Okay, thank you.

COUNCILWOMAN ZINCK

Yes, and I was just going to say I think it might be helpful if even we gave you an example of maybe what's in here, but I agree that you should take the time to read through it and if you have any concerns. An example is no Town officer or employee shall accept other employment which will impair his or her independent judgment in the

exercises of their duties. So they're looking for no conflicts of interest, some of these things. But there's a whole list of them, so yeah, it would be a good...

*(Away from microphone, Goodman Freed, 167 Bennington Hills Court, "(Inaudible) try to (inaudible) that.")*

COUNCILWOMAN ZINCK

And out.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Well to be real honest with you, (E) and (F) had been around for a long time and I spent (6) years on the Town Board, I never somebody print out (E) and (F) so we could read it. And we're printing out an Ethics Policy so everybody can read and everybody will have training on it and everybody's going to adhere to it or they're going to be someplace else. Is there any...

*(Unidentified from audience, "Would you?")*

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Absolutely. Is there anybody else that would like to comment?

COMMANDER JACK GRECO, 104 LIPPMAN ROAD

So I want to...

SUPERVISOR MOORE

No, we have to have your name and address, please.

COMMANDER JACK GRECO, 104 LIPPMAN ROAD

So my name is Commander Jack Greco. I think most of you know who I am. I'm not going to reiterate everything about ethics except for to say you keep it in between the white lines. So when the red, when the light is red, you stop. When it's green, you go. Unfortunately, not just towns, but government agencies, corporations, they've always done things a little bit unethical. This is an opportunity to put people on the spot and say, "You want to work here? These are the rules. You don't? Leave." So it's a real good thing though.

*(Away from microphone, Goodman Freed, 167 Bennington Hills Court, "As long as it doesn't turn into a dictatorship.")*

COMMANDER JACK GRECO, 104 LIPPMAN ROAD

No, nothing is a dictatorship and I agree with you, but thank you.

*(Away from microphone, Goodman Freed, 167 Bennington Hills Court, "That's one of the problems.")*

COMMANDER JACK GRECO, 104 LIPPMAN ROAD

I agree.

COUNCILWOMAN ZINCK

And I have to be honest with you, I have questions what a few of them mean myself, so I need some clarification myself before I vote on it.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Is there anybody else that would like to speak or I'd be glad to close this one. *(Pause, no response)* We'll close this Public Hearing. The next one I have is a Special Permit Application 2014-019, the Cartwright Inn Flea Market. Please state your name and...

WILLIAM POLLAK, 5711 WEST HENRIETTA ROAD, CARTWRIGHT INN FLEA MARKET

William Pollak, 5711 West Henrietta Road.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

And why don't you, so that we have a lot larger group tonight than what we had when you were here before, you can tell them what you were thinking about doing.

WILLIAM POLLAK, 5711 WEST HENRIETTA ROAD, CARTWRIGHT INN FLEA MARKET

Alright, so I've been thinking about doing a flea market...

SUPERVISOR MOORE

No, you have to use the microphone.

WILLIAM POLLAK, 5711 WEST HENRIETTA ROAD, CARTWRIGHT INN FLEA MARKET

I've been thinking about doing a flea market on the corner of Erie Station and West Henrietta Road. Just an open air flea market for roughly ten (10) to thirty (30) vendors, most likely thinking ten (10) is probably going to be the target number and just having extras in case we should happen to get busy. The operation hours would be from 8:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. in the afternoon as long as that's okay with everybody. I'm willing to work with anybody who may have any issues or problems with that or anything else that I'm proposing. I don't have any PA systems or live concerts going on, nothing like that. And that's pretty much it.

*(Unidentified from audience, "How many days a week?")*

WILLIAM POLLAK, 5711 WEST HENRIETTA ROAD, CARTWRIGHT INN FLEA MARKET

One (1) day, Saturday.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Okay, thank you.

*(Away from microphone, Ginny Williams, 47 Overland Trail, "I have a question for you, sir.")*

WILLIAM POLLAK, 5711 WEST HENRIETTA ROAD, CARTWRIGHT INN FLEA MARKET  
Sure.

COUNCILMAN PAGE

Please state your name and address, please. Thank you.

GINNY WILLIAMS, 47 OVERLAND TRAIL

I'm Ginny Williams and I live at 47 Overland Trail. I've been down to the flea market at Cartwright's and it was a disaster because there was no lanes to park, no signage, no organization whatsoever.

WILLIAM POLLAK, 5711 WEST HENRIETTA ROAD, CARTWRIGHT INN FLEA MARKET  
Right.

GINNY WILLIAMS, 47 OVERLAND TRAIL

Is that going to be clarified going forward?

WILLIAM POLLAK, 5711 WEST HENRIETTA ROAD, CARTWRIGHT INN FLEA MARKET

Yes, we're actually going to be using the entire parking lot as a parking lot so there will be areas for people to pull in and pull out. There will be signage and people directing traffic need be.

GINNY WILLIAMS, 47 OVERLAND TRAIL

Okay, because it was a mess before.

WILLIAM POLLAK, 5711 WEST HENRIETTA ROAD, CARTWRIGHT INN FLEA MARKET

Right, I understand, I'm not the same person who was running it last year. I'm hoping we'll do a much better job this year.

GINNY WILLIAMS, 47 OVERLAND TRAIL

I hope you do too.

*(Away from microphone, Goodman Freed, 167 Bennington Hills Court, "Excuse me, (inaudible).")*

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Sir, you've got to come to the microphone.

COUNCILMAN MULLIGAN

Put him in a chair. Get a chair for him.

GOODMAN FREED, 167 BENNINGTON HILLS COURT

Goody Freed, 167 Bennington Hills Court, West Henrietta. Are you talking about indoor or outdoor?

WILLIAM POLLAK, 5711 WEST HENRIETTA ROAD, CARTWRIGHT INN FLEA MARKET  
Outdoor.

GOODMAN FREED, 167 BENNINGTON HILLS COURT  
Outdoor.

WILLIAM POLLAK, 5711 WEST HENRIETTA ROAD, CARTWRIGHT INN FLEA MARKET  
Yes, outside.

GOODMAN FREED, 167 BENNINGTON HILLS COURT  
Because as I understand you can't use the building indoor because there's no plumbing...

WILLIAM POLLAK, 5711 WEST HENRIETTA ROAD, CARTWRIGHT INN FLEA MARKET  
Yeah, there's no plumbing.

GOODMAN FREED, 167 BENNINGTON HILLS COURT  
...or electrical whatever.

WILLIAM POLLAK, 5711 WEST HENRIETTA ROAD, CARTWRIGHT INN FLEA MARKET  
Yeah, it's not in (*inaudible*) good condition for people running through there.

GOODMAN FREED, 167 BENNINGTON HILLS COURT  
Oh, okay.

COUNCILMAN MULLIGAN  
Sir, I have a question for you.

GOODMAN FREED, 167 BENNINGTON HILLS COURT  
Yes, sir.

COUNCILMAN MULLIGAN  
You indicated you worked in politics your entire life and for the most part it's been unethical, where did you do this work?

GOODMAN FREED, 167 BENNINGTON HILLS COURT  
I'm the son of a Philadelphia lawyer.

COUNCILMAN MULLIGAN  
So this was in Pennsylvania?

GOODMAN FREED, 167 BENNINGTON HILLS COURT  
Yeah, Pennsylvania and, mostly Pennsylvania.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

How'd you get up here?

GOODMAN FREED, 167 BENNINGTON HILLS COURT

My daughter lives in Pittsford. You can complain to her.

*(Laughter)*

GOODMAN FREED, 167 BENNINGTON HILLS COURT

When I was five (5) years old I was teaching people how to use a voting machine, so I've been in it a long time.

DANIEL MASTRELLA, TOWN ATTORNEY

And just, I'm sorry, just for the Record, so that the members of the public know that there was a Public Hearing already held on this Special Permit Application two (2) weeks ago and closed where there was testimony from the public.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Right, so we'll go ahead and close the Hearing tonight and we'll have a Findings of Fact.

COUNCILMAN BREESE

Mr. Supervisor, on Application SP2014-019, the Applicant, William Pollak-Surry has requested a Special Permit to hold an outdoor flea market on the premises of the former Cartwright Inn located at 5691 West Henrietta Road on Saturdays and Sundays from 6:00 a.m. until 4:00 p.m. from May 9, 2014 through December 31, 2014. This property, although zoned Commercial, is adjacent to several residential properties including a number of single family residences and the nearby Erie Station Village Residential Complex. Although commercial uses such as proposed are allowed of right if conducted within a building, such uses require a Special Permit if a material part of the business is to be carried on outdoors. The Town has experience with this type of use, having granted a Special Permit for a virtually identical flea market in 2013 to a different Applicant on the same site. The Director of the Department of Building and Fire Prevention submitted a memo noting that at the 2013 flea market there were complaints registered with the Town regarding the noise created in the residential area, traffic flow, parking issues, and complaints about the generally poor appearance of the site as an open air flea market. Moreover, at the Public Hearing there was testimony from nearby residents and from the owners of the nearby Erie Station Village Residential Complex voicing concerns with appearance, traffic, and noise as experienced by residents during the 2013 flea market. This Applicant has offered no substantial modifications or corrective plans to the proposal other than to state that the parking will be conducted on the parking lot area of this site and that he will hire someone to direct traffic. In order to sustain its burden to obtain a Special Permit, an Applicant must meet the criteria set forth in Henrietta Town Code Section §295-53. Based upon the presentation of the proposal itself, the testimony of nearby landowners and the historical experience with the site as set forth by Town staff, I believe the

Applicant has failed to meet this burden. The Record before us reveals that the open air flea market use will have a negative effect on the orderly development and character of the neighborhood and the conduct of the other lawful residential uses in the vicinity and will not be in harmony with the existing quiet residential character of the neighborhood. Based upon past experience, it is expected that the proposed use will create hazards due to traffic congestion, crowds, and parking of automobiles and will have a generally negative impact on the surrounding properties. I therefore move we deny this Application.

COUNCILWOMAN ZINCK  
Second.

SUPERVISOR MOORE  
Discussion?

COUNCILWOMAN ZINCK  
I just...

COUNCILMAN MULLIGAN  
Go ahead.

COUNCILWOMAN ZINCK  
I just want to say I know you're very disappointed and I know you were really good about trying to compromise and make the hours shorter. We just have a real concern with where you're doing it.

WILLIAM POLLAK, 5711 WEST HENRIETTA ROAD, CARTWRIGHT INN FLEA MARKET  
Right.

COUNCILWOMAN ZINCK  
So I think maybe if you were to find another place...

WILLIAM POLLAK, 5711 WEST HENRIETTA ROAD, CARTWRIGHT INN FLEA MARKET  
Okay.

COUNCILWOMAN ZINCK  
...it might not have the same result.

WILLIAM POLLAK, 5711 WEST HENRIETTA ROAD, CARTWRIGHT INN FLEA MARKET  
Gotcha.

COUNCILMAN MULLIGAN  
So an Aye vote is a vote to deny?

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Correct. Please call the roll.

WILLIAM POLLAK, 5711 WEST HENRIETTA ROAD, CARTWRIGHT INN FLEA MARKET

Thank you.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

We have the first Resolution, Rick Page will go to the podium and we have a special recognition that he will read.

COUNCILMAN PAGE

Good evening. I'm Rick Page, 155 Cape Henry Trail, West Henrietta, New York.

*(Laughter)*

COUNCILMAN PAGE

It is my honor tonight to present a new award that was created from a recommendation from the Youth Board to the Town Board and from the Recreation and Youth Department. It's an award that's called the Henrietta Youth Asset Advocate of the Year Award. In 1995 a think tank out west in Minnesota called the Search Institute did thousands of hours of study and surveys across the country and through their work they came up with the Healthy Communities, Healthy Family model, the forty (40) Developmental Assets. Forty (40) Developmental Assets are building blocks that communities, schools, religious organizations, towns, and villages are charged with finding and developing. They're building blocks for our youth, especially ages grade eight (8) through twelve (12). And just to give you an idea of forty (40) Developmental Assets, they're divided up into six (6) major categories and I'm not going to read all forty (40), believe me. - New York Property Maintenance Code, Section 107, **Unsafe Structures and Equipment**;
  - 1) Sub-section 107.2 – **Unsafe Structures**. An unsafe structure that is found to be dangerous to life, health, property or safety of the public.
  - 2) Sub-section 107.3 – **Structure unfit for human occupancy**. A structure is unfit for human occupancy whenever the structure is unsafe, unlawful, or because of the degree to which the structure is in disrepair or lacks maintenance or the location of the structure constitutes a hazard to the public or occupants.
- This property was involved in a serious structure fire in July 2001 and since then has been vacant. Deterioration of the structure has been occurring and the structure is at a point where it needs to be demolished. There is extreme interior fire damage to both floors and the roof is showing signs of significant disrepair and will eventually collapse, which will lead to stress of the four exterior load bearing walls, which given time will also collapse. As the building is approximately 30-35 feet from East Henrietta Road, it is a cause of concern for public safety. The rear entrance has been secured numerous times but to no avail to keep trespassers out. As the building is beyond repair, it constitutes a public nuisance and a public safety issue in the Town of Henrietta and should be demolished.

BARBARA CHIRDO, DIRECTOR OF FINANCE

I didn't actually think it was thirteen (13) months, I actually think it may be a little shorter.

COUNCILMAN BREESE

Alright.

BARBARA CHIRDO, DIRECTOR OF FINANCE

When I asked her about an Acting position, she didn't have, unfortunately she didn't have Karen listed with an Acting title, because the paperwork wasn't there, so they only

ever had Karen as the Assistant title, which is what she, according to them, is still in. So an Acting position, I thought it was up to twelve (12) months, thirteen (13) may be correct, I'm not entirely sure, but from my understanding it's up to a twelve (12) month maximum.

COUNCILMAN BREESE

Thank you.

BARBARA CHIRDO, DIRECTOR OF FINANCE

Anything else?

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Thank you, Barbara.

COUNCILMAN PAGE

Thank you.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Yes, sir?

CATALDO MAGGIULI, 45 PINNACLE ROAD

I've been here in Henrietta since 1955

COUNCILMAN PAGE

Address and name, please.

CATALDO MAGGIULI, 45 PINNACLE ROAD

Pardon me?

COUNCILMAN PAGE

Would you please state your address and a *(inaudible)* for the Minutes?

CATALDO MAGGIULI, 45 PINNACLE ROAD

My address, I live at 45 Pinnacle Road, Town of Henrietta, and I've been there since 1955. Around 1955 I used to hunt pheasants on Jefferson Road. And I'm grateful I've been in Henrietta all these years. I was on the Zoning and Planning Board from 1962, 1960 to 1972 and I know what the city grew up. But I'm grateful now, at my age, I live alone on 45 Pinnacle Road and my social life is the Henrietta Senior Citizen, the Don Cook Senior Citizen.

*(Applause)*

CATALDO MAGGIULI, 45 PINNACLE ROAD

And I'm grateful for one (1) person, who's the Director of the place, Shelly Gorino. I'll tell you right now, I wish she had run Eastman Kodak, I would've had my health

insurance now.

*(Applause)*

CATALDO MAGGIULI, 45 PINNACLE ROAD

I think everybody that goes to the Senior Citizen are very grateful for Shelly and the Town that gives us those privileges. Henrietta is well known from the Senior Citizen. There's no one in the county that matches what she's done, I'm serious about that. These people can take an inventory anyplace and ask for the same results. Arrivederci.

COUNCILMAN PAGE

Thank you.

*(Applause)*

DANIEL MASTRELLA, TOWN ATTORNEY

Sir, your name. Sir? Sir? Can we get your name for the Record sir, you didn't...

CATALDO MAGGIULI, 45 PINNACLE ROAD

My name?

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Al Maggiuli.

COUNCILMAN BREESE

Al Maggiuli.

CATALDO MAGGIULI, 45 PINNACLE ROAD

C-A-T-A-L-D-O, middle name's Aldino, A-L-D-I-N-O, last name's Maggiuli, M-A-G-G-I-U-L-I. I'm Irish.

*(Laughter)*

COUNCILWOMAN ZINCK

Oh yeah.

RUTH TURK, 21 TIMBERLINE DRIVE

He's the Godfather. Ruth Turk, 21 Timberline Drive, West Henrietta. I've been there for... yeah, that many years. I don't remember how long I've been there. Forty (40) years? Thank you. Anyway, I have a letter here that I want to give to Supervisor Moore, but I also have copies for the Board.

COUNCILMAN PAGE

Thank you.

RUTH TURK, 21 TIMBERLINE DRIVE

The letter's been signed by sixty (60) people from the Senior Citizen Center. It says *Dear Members of the Council, on May 8<sup>th</sup>, Supervisor Moore invited Shelly Gorino, the Henrietta Senior Center's Program Director to a meeting. Shelly was sure that the meeting was going to involve a matter pertinent to the Henrietta Senior Citizen Program. Instead, when the conversation began, Mr. Moore was speaking of a topic completely impertinent to the Center. As Shelly realized that the topic wasn't what she was going to hear, to her position or the Senior Center, she began to walk out of the meeting. At this point, Mr. Moore spoke to her as if Shelly was a child, ordering her to sit down. As a result, he suspended Shelly for a day without pay. This act of power flinging was and is a slap in the face of the Henrietta Senior Citizens. Shelly is a valued person who treats her job as one working for the benefits of the elders of Henrietta and without her, the Henrietta Senior Program would not be one of the best in Monroe County. We, the members of the Henrietta Senior Center feel strongly that Mr. Moore owes Shelly an apology and a day's pay. To treat a valued fellow Town employee as if she were a disobedient child is a direct act of arrogance on the part of Mr. Moore. Sincerely,* and then we have all the names. Mr. Moore, directly to you, if we treated you the way you think others have treated you, you are wrong. We try to treat you with respect, but people will treat you the way you treat them and I can tell you that you will suffer in the long run.

*(Applause)*

DANIEL MASTRELLA, TOWN ATTORNEY

Mr. Supervisor, as the last speaker and perhaps more are directing comments to the Board that relate specifically to an individual employee and a personnel and disciplinary matter, while the public is certainly entitled to make any public comment they want, I would caution the Board that it would be inappropriate for the Board or the Supervisor to publicly respond in a personnel disciplinary matter.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Thank you.

GLADYS REEVES-HARGRAVE, 3833 EAST HENRIETTA ROAD

My name is Gladys Reeves-Hargrave. I live on 3833 East Henrietta Road. I came in here tonight with one thing on my mind, but after listening to what's been going on, I have another thing on my mind. And if there's anyone that loves Henrietta more than I do, I'd like to meet them. I have three (3) boys that they educated on different levels. I worked for the Town, the School District, for about eighteen (18) years. But some of the things that I've heard tonight, it makes me ashamed of Henrietta. And it started with you, Mr. Moore. I'm sorry to say that. Karen is sitting right back there and I understand what you just said, but you started it with talking about someone. And I automatically thought about what about the (inaudible), what about the professionalism. You don't talk about people in an open meeting like this. Everybody knows what has happened for the most part, the people that are here that are involved.

That is totally mean spirited to talk about someone like that and they're right here. And she can't say anything because of the ethics. You understand what I'm saying? And it's another thing, now Mr. Page used to be my boss. When I hear that, about the ethics, it sounds like Henrietta's never had any ethics. I think we have. I think he's one of the most ethical people that I've ever met. So was your father, although he could be very grumpy and very mean sometimes...

*(Laughter)*

GLADYS REEVES-HARGRAVE, 3833 EAST HENRIETTA ROAD

...but you know I have to tell it the way it is and to hear someone talk about the ethics almost like they never appeared and that we're going to have a better Recreation Center, just give him a chance. You know, with her sitting right there, that doesn't feel good. It just does not feel good. You know, I'm a mother, I've been a mother for a long time to a lot of different children and if it's one thing that I taught them was to be kind hearted. You don't treat people that way. You don't be mean spirited, you don't be a bully. You know what I'm saying? That's just easy to learn and I mean it's going to come right back at you. I don't care, I came from the south, and the old people used to say to me what you do in the dark is going to come to the light sooner or later. It is.

*(Applause)*

GLADYS REEVES-HARGRAVE, 3833 EAST HENRIETTA ROAD

I don't care, I don't care if you're Republican, I don't care if you're Independent, I don't care if you're Democrat, I truly don't. As long as you're doing the best for Henrietta, I'm right with you, I don't care. But to stand up here and actually hear someone talk about someone in the way that I've heard it tonight, it makes me ashamed. Now I worked at the County for about twenty-five (25) years at Monroe Community Hospital as a nurse and I don't know all of the rules and regulations, I'm not a lawyer, I'm nowhere near, I am just a mother and a friend to people. But we had a situation in Monroe Community where years ago people used to come right out of high school and go to work at Monroe Community and they could do the work just as good if not better than the people that had all of the degrees. There was a law in some cases where they did grandfathering, where they would grandfather in, some of those people were illiterate, yet they knew how to take care of people just as well as someone that did have the degrees. Now Karen is not my best buddy, we don't socialize together, but I do know of her work. What has happened from what I've heard just through the grapevine, because I don't have her ear and she doesn't have my ear, the way things have gone down, why does someone look at that? Well, I'll give you a warning, start working on whatever it is you need to maintain your job before you just automatically fire or do whatever it is you did to her, replace her job. All that I'm saying is that it doesn't cost anything to be kind and not mean spirited to people. Give people a chance, we all need a chance, I know I do. And thank you for your time.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Thank you.

*(Applause)*

MARK AUDINO, 237 BECKWITH ROAD

Hi, good evening, Mark Audino, 237 Beckwith Road.

COUNCILWOMAN ZINCK

Mark, lift the... yes, thank you, you're a tall one.

MARK AUDINO, 237 BECKWITH ROAD

Okay, 237 Beckwith Road. I have two (2) requests and a question. The first request is I came here a couple months ago, I talked with Councilman Page. I have a concern on West Henrietta Road. Car dealers have been unloading their cars in the middle of West Henrietta Road. I tried talking to the State Police, I've tried talking to the County Sheriffs, it's no secret who I work for, I'm concerned someone's going to get hurt or get killed. It's been continuing, I've talked to the Sheriffs again. There was another incident the other day that I witnessed again, cars coming in and out of 7-11. The cars basically are by the Garber dealerships and they're unloading their cars in the middle of West Henrietta Road. It's just a matter of time before someone gets hurt. They're running back and forth bringing the cars in, is there something we can do as a Town outside of police action? Because the Sheriffs and the Police, you talk to them, they're nice about it, but the reality of it is they're too busy, and they're not, other than putting an extra note in their memo to keep an eye on it. I'm afraid someone's going to get hurt or get killed. I personally have almost hit one of these drivers.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

And I totally agree with you. The last Applicant that came before the Board about a car dealership on West Henrietta Road, I explicitly asked him about unloading cars in the road. I was with one of the highway trucks at 3:00 one morning plowing snow on West Henrietta Road in late March and they were unloading cars in the middle of the road. The Deputy Supervisor has been over to Garber twice now to see Mr. Parker that runs the operation and he has...

MARK AUDINO, 237 BECKWITH ROAD

I'm sorry, I'm not sure if it's Garber or the dealership themselves, I'm just saying that's where the trucks are parked. I mean there's other dealerships there, I'm not one hundred percent (100%) positive where they're going.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Let me finish and we'll get to all of them, okay? And what we have is we discussed with Mr. Parker, because he's the man that runs Garber and we felt that that was the biggest problem. They've been unloading cars on St. Patrick Drive. We had refurbished St. Patrick Drive last year, so when they put the ramps down to unload the

cars, they gouged the road. Well it's our job to protect the taxpayers' property so we've been there, we've seen them. I've talked to the Captain in the B Zone about it so that we could ticket people. Two (2) weeks ago the Deputy Supervisor was out inspecting some chicken hen permits that we had given out and he witnessed two (2) car carriers in the middle of West Henrietta Road unloading at the Mercedes dealership. We at that point in time, he called and I said, "Well call 911." And he more or less did that and we hopefully have that stopped. He also went and saw Mr. Dorschel and talked to Mr. Dorschel about it. We're trying to be as proactive as we can, but unless we sit over there probably we're not going to catch them all. But sooner or later somebody's going to get killed by driving into that car carrier and going up and being launched off the front side of it, so I totally agree with you.

MARK AUDINO, 237 BECKWITH ROAD

Well I almost did, so I just don't want it to happen.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Yeah, and I don't know what more to do. I do believe that the Sheriffs are probably taxed and we haven't tried the State Troopers yet, maybe that's the next step, but I totally agree with you.

MARK AUDINO, 237 BECKWITH ROAD

I talked to them, but they're so busy. I just didn't know if there was something we could do to...

SUPERVISOR MOORE

We're on it, it's a pet peeve of mine. I believe if you're going to be able to sell cars over there, you ought to have enough room on your own property to unload them.

MARK AUDINO, 237 BECKWITH ROAD

Okay, the second request is, well actually, thanks for taking care of the property on East Henrietta Road, I appreciate that. However, there's a property on West Henrietta Road on top of Methodist Hill, right across from Woodcrest Commons, I think it's next to the Bean farm. The house has been collapsed now for twenty-five (25) years. There's a tree growing out of the middle of it. It's right on the edge of the road.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Well...

MARK AUDINO, 237 BECKWITH ROAD

Since we're condemning properties, could we clean that up?

SUPERVISOR MOORE

A week ago that was leveled by Bill Bean.

MARK AUDINO, 237 BECKWITH ROAD

It was, okay.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

It has yet to be taken away. I go by it every morning at 5:30, and if you had a wind coming from the wrong direction, it would be in the road. And the Bean family, in less than about four (4) days got it down for us.

MARK AUDINO, 237 BECKWITH ROAD

Okay great.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

I don't believe we've had an administration that's been proactive in trying to get some of these eyesores out like we're trying to do. And if you got any more, all you have to do is call my office and I'll go after them.

MARK AUDINO, 237 BECKWITH ROAD

I didn't drive by there in the last week so I didn't see it.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Well I'm just...

MARK AUDINO, 237 BECKWITH ROAD

I just, since you had brought it up, I figured I'd mention it and see if it was something...

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Actually, and we've been on that less than a week and we got it accomplished.

MARK AUDINO, 237 BECKWITH ROAD

Okay, the last is a question for you. With all the changes, and I understand you're a new Supervisor and you're changing Department Heads, that you're right. Are any of these Department Heads required to live in the Town?

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Certain Department Heads are, yes, by Town Law.

MARK AUDINO, 237 BECKWITH ROAD

And the reason I'm asking is I live on Beckwith Road, I love my neighborhood, I've been there for twenty (20) years. However, I now have six (6) party houses in my neighborhood because absentee landlords, they're there to make money, the kids are renting the property out. My concern is, and I see it where I work in other places too, people that from out of the community come to work in this Town, they get a paycheck from this Town and at 5:00 they leave, they don't care about the Town. Personal opinion, I would like to see Department Heads live in the community, because when you live in the community, you have more of a stake in the community, you're raising a

family in the community, you're paying attention to what's going on in your neighborhoods and you care about your community, you're not just leaving at 5:00 p.m.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Totally agree with you.

MARK AUDINO, 237 BECKWITH ROAD

And the last thing is it's no secret I'm good friends with Karen, I think she's a great woman, isn't there any way they could've changed the title through civil service rather than...?

SUPERVISOR MOORE

We tried.

MARK AUDINO, 237 BECKWITH ROAD

I mean there's no... change titles all the time with different requirements. I just think she's, my kids have done great with her, she's, they've volunteered in different organizations, different communities and stuff, she's a great asset and I hate to see a great asset be squelched or be, what's the word for it, well, bummed out about doing their job. I mean she's been a great asset to the community. I think she deserves a little better, personally.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Thank you.

BARBARA HATCH, 94 TOMAHAWK TRAIL

The longer I sit here, the more things I hear. Paychex sued so the dealership cannot download cars...

SUPERVISOR MOORE

I can't hear you.

BARBARA HATCH, 94 TOMAHAWK TRAIL

Excuse me, Barbara Hatch, 94 Tomahawk Trail. Paychex sued Vision on Panorama Trail. They no longer download cars, so that would solve one problem. Anyway, I'm concerned about the dog park. It's nice that we've got an original grant to pay for the fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000.00) of the thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000.00), whatever it was, who's going to maintain this? I don't own a dog, because I don't want the extra expense. I don't want to have to pay for a dog park for people who, it's going to have to be maintained year round and where's that money coming from, what budget is it coming from?

SUPERVISOR MOORE

There's fees, twenty-four dollars (\$24.00) per dog to use the dog park.

BARBARA HATCH, 94 TOMAHAWK TRAIL

Will that, do we know that's going to cover? We don't know what the budget is for this, what it's going to...

SUPERVISOR MOORE

We haven't got to that point to know, it's going to be, it's park land that will be mowed and the only additional expense after it's established would be litter bags and somebody to take the litter away.

BARBARA HATCH, 94 TOMAHAWK TRAIL

Just, I don't want to see it...

SUPERVISOR MOORE

That's kind of like saying, "I don't want to pay for the library because I don't use the library."

BARBARA HATCH, 94 TOMAHAWK TRAIL

No, no, no, this is something totally different. A library is a public asset and a part of the educational community. A dog is optional. And I hear people who won't take their dogs to a dog park because of the dog fights and the veterinarians say, "Do not take your dog to a dog park, because of the fights and the huge veterinary bills." And I don't have a dog, but there are expenses and I just don't want to see it on my tax bill.

COUNCILMAN PAGE

Just, if I could help, through you, Mr. Supervisor, we own that park now. Did you know that?

BARBARA HATCH, 94 TOMAHAWK TRAIL

Well that's fine, who's going to clean it up, who's going to...?

COUNCILMAN PAGE

We already are doing it. We mow the lawn and maintain it now, it's part of our park system. The only expense for the dog park basically is the fencing, which is being paid for with a grant. We would have to mow the lawn and keep it anyway. We feel that the twenty-four dollar (\$24.00) fee that's charged will more than cover for the litter bags and the amenities. And also when we looked into buying Lookup Park years ago, Councilwoman Zinck and I held a meeting with about thirty-five (35) people from the community to give us ideas and to go out into the community and ask, "What different things would you like to see if we were to own that park?" The dog park was number one of every single person in that committee from the public. And it's also going to be, through Mr. Moore's help, part of the Monroe County dog park, so the twenty-four dollars (\$24.00) would get you into Greece's dog park, Ellison park, it's part of the County's, and there will be support that way too. We didn't feel there was any significant increase in cost to the Town or the taxpayers because of those reasons.

BARBARA HATCH, 94 TOMAHAWK TRAIL  
And any liabilities of these damaged dogs...

COUNCILMAN PAGE  
We have liability, of course everything we own we have major liability on.

BARBARA HATCH, 94 TOMAHAWK TRAIL  
Okay.

COUNCILWOMAN ZINCK  
I think the other thing that's just important to add on is we're very limited what we could do in that park. There are restrictions in that park where we can't build anything, so these were the options we were looking at is things where very minimal impact and structure.

BARBARA HATCH, 94 TOMAHAWK TRAIL  
Okay, thank you.

SUPERVISOR MOORE  
That park came with a conservation easement.

BARBARA HATCH, 94 TOMAHAWK TRAIL  
Yeah.

SUPERVISOR MOORE  
When the Foundation bought it they applied for an easement, or for that conservation easement, so we can't really alter that park whatsoever.

BARBARA HATCH, 94 TOMAHAWK TRAIL  
Okay.

COUNCILMAN PAGE  
Thank you.

BARBARA HATCH, 94 TOMAHAWK TRAIL  
Thank you.

GOODMAN FREED, 167 BENNINGTON HILLS COURT  
Goodman Freed, 167 Bennington Hills Court, West Henrietta.

*(Laughter)*

GOODMAN FREED, 167 BENNINGTON HILLS COURT  
Question about the dog park. First of all, is there any place where you have all this

information, how high is the fence going to be?

SUPERVISOR MOORE  
Approximately six feet (6').

GOODMAN FREED, 167 BENNINGTON HILLS COURT  
And you have water, running water there?

SUPERVISOR MOORE  
There will actually be a small dog park...

GOODMAN FREED, 167 BENNINGTON HILLS COURT  
Is there going to be like a stream or anything through it?

SUPERVISOR MOORE  
...and a large dog park.

COUNCILMAN PAGE  
What's that?

GOODMAN FREED, 167 BENNINGTON HILLS COURT  
Is there any stream or pond on the property?

SUPERVISOR MOORE  
There's a stream there that'll be running right through it.

COUNCILMAN MULLIGAN  
Couple ponds.

COUNCILWOMAN ZINCK  
And there's a separate one for small dogs and another one for big ones.

GOODMAN FREED, 167 BENNINGTON HILLS COURT  
A separate for small...

SUPERVISOR MOORE  
There'll be a wash area where you can wash your dog off after you come out.

GOODMAN FREED, 167 BENNINGTON HILLS COURT  
Also, do the people who bring their dogs have to stay there or can they bring their dogs in the morning and leave?

SUPERVISOR MOORE  
No, there's no dog babysitting service.

COUNCILWOMAN ZINCK

No.

GOODMAN FREED, 167 BENNINGTON HILLS COURT

You know what I'm saying, because people have a tendency to do that kind of thing and then they don't pick up after their dog. That's another problem.

COUNCILWOMAN ZINCK

You know, I had the same concern, but I have to tell you, through research and, it's only as good as the research you do, but they say that people that utilize dog parks are very good about kind of policing it themselves, not that we wouldn't have some participation in that. But they say they're very good at policing the property.

GOODMAN FREED, 167 BENNINGTON HILLS COURT

Yeah, I spent some time in Arlington, Virginia and they have a number of dog parks all around Washington. That was a very big thing.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

I thought you were from Pennsylvania.

COUNCILWOMAN ZINCK

He's been everywhere.

*(Laughter)*

GOODMAN FREED, 167 BENNINGTON HILLS COURT

And the people do... even though the politicians don't clean up after themselves, the people do clean up after their dogs, so that the dog park is really an asset. It also allows the dogs to be socialized so that people who are worried about angry dogs, we got more postmen bitten in, I don't know if it's Monroe County or Henrietta, than anyplace else. But when the dogs are socialized, you don't have that problem so much.

COUNCILWOMAN ZINCK

And then they're tired neighbor dogs.

GOODMAN FREED, 167 BENNINGTON HILLS COURT

And the dogs also police themselves. If in the dog park one dog goes after another dog, it seems that the pack will help the dog that's weakest and fend off for him and protect him. It's just a very strange situation in a dog park.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Maybe you should come see me. You could be the dog park czar. What do you think?

*(Laughter)*

GOODMAN FREED, 167 BENNINGTON HILLS COURT  
Anyway, I'm pro dog park.

COUNCILMAN PAGE  
Thank you.

SUPERVISOR MOORE  
Thank you.

GINNY WILLIAMS, 47 OVERLAND TRAIL  
Okay, I got it. I wasn't going to bring this up. My name is Ginny Williams, 47 Overland Trail again. I'm a foster mom for dogs, okay. I left a message with the Clerk because the letter we received says that if a dog is with us for over thirty (30) days, it has to be licensed. Well sometimes I have a dog for forty (40) days. Sometimes I have a dog for twenty (20). I really don't want somebody coming to my door and saying that's your dog, because it's not, and I have all the paperwork to prove it. But my question to you has nothing to do with my fostering. I do want to clarify that with you, but the dog park, whose name is on the twenty-four dollar (\$24.00) fee? The person or the dog?

SUPERVISOR MOORE  
The dog.

GINNY WILLIAMS, 47 OVERLAND TRAIL  
That's not going to help me. As a foster mom, I might have five (5) dogs for the summer season: one (1) dog this month, one (1) dog next month, one (1) dog after that. If you put it in the dog's name, you're not helping me.

COUNCILMAN MULLIGAN  
Maybe call them all the same name.

*(Laughter)*

GINNY WILLIAMS, 47 OVERLAND TRAIL  
I have no choice. They come the way they come. *(Laughter)*

COUNCILWOMAN ZINCK  
You can only take two (2), right? Tell me how this goes.

GINNY WILLIAMS, 47 OVERLAND TRAIL  
No, no, no, I only get one (1) at a time.

COUNCILWOMAN ZINCK  
Right, okay.

GINNY WILLIAMS, 47 OVERLAND TRAIL

That's not the issue.

COUNCILWOMAN ZINCK

Okay.

GINNY WILLIAMS, 47 OVERLAND TRAIL

The issue is if I sign up and the thing's in my name, then whichever dog I happen to have...

SUPERVISOR MOORE

All I can tell you is in order to be part of the County system, we have to have the same rules as the County system.

GINNY WILLIAMS, 47 OVERLAND TRAIL

Okay, because in Greece...

SUPERVISOR MOORE

This is all new to me.

GINNY WILLIAMS, 47 OVERLAND TRAIL

Because in Greece, I can sign myself up. And at Ellison Park, I can sign me up.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Then that very well may be the case, because we really haven't gotten to the point where we're signing anybody up, because we don't have a dog park yet.

COUNCILWOMAN ZINCK

You bring up a very interesting point that I don't think any of us really thought of, but I think one of the other things about us registering the dog is then we can check and make sure they have all their shots and that's important for each dog.

GINNY WILLIAMS, 47 OVERLAND TRAIL

Well yeah, but you can always bring that. I mean if you take your dog to a nursing home, you have to take your list of things. I think when you sign up you should take your list of things.

COUNCILWOMAN ZINCK

Well we might need to think about...

COUNCILMAN MULLIGAN

You should get involved.

COUNCILWOMAN ZINCK

Yeah.

GINNY WILLIAMS, 47 OVERLAND TRAIL  
Sometimes, it's a *(inaudible)*.

SUPERVISOR MOORE  
We may need you to help us with some of the dog stuff, because...

GINNY WILLIAMS, 47 OVERLAND TRAIL  
I would love to.

SUPERVISOR MOORE  
...it's totally new.

GINNY WILLIAMS, 47 OVERLAND TRAIL  
But I need you to help me.

COUNCILWOMAN ZINCK  
Yeah.

GINNY WILLIAMS, 47 OVERLAND TRAIL  
And everybody else that's a foster parent.

SUPERVISOR MOORE  
Come see me.

GINNY WILLIAMS, 47 OVERLAND TRAIL  
No, no. And everybody else that's a foster parent in Henrietta, because with the rule that you have, the newsletter that you sent it said thirty (30) days. Now, if I get a heartworm positive dog, A) I can't take it to the dog park, and B) I can't adopt it out until it's done twelve (12) weeks of rehab. It's in my home, it's not my dog. The rule has to be the owner, as opposed to the person who cares for it.

SUPERVISOR MOORE  
I'm sure that's something we can work out. You just need to come see me and because these are all different things we're going to come upon as we move forward. If we didn't do the dog park, we wouldn't have any of these problems.

GINNY WILLIAMS, 47 OVERLAND TRAIL  
I know.

SUPERVISOR MOORE  
So we want to do the dog park so we can have the problems.

GINNY WILLIAMS, 47 OVERLAND TRAIL  
And I, yay the dog park, because it's the greatest way to take a foster. You know, after

you've done the initial check to see if the dog's going to work well with other dogs, then as a good foster mom, you take it to a dog park so it's exposed to more than that.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Absolutely.

COUNCILMAN MULLIGAN

Thank you.

COUNCILWOMAN ZINCK

Yeah.

COUNCILMAN PAGE

Thank you.

COUNCILWOMAN ZINCK

So you get an exception, you come talk to one of us and we'll figure something out.

GINNY WILLIAMS, 47 OVERLAND TRAIL

I just don't want you to come to my door and say, "Look, you owe me a million dollars (\$1,000,000.00) because you have twelve (12) different dogs running around." I don't, I only have one (1) at a time. Alright, thank you.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Okay, thank you.

JOHN SCHMITT, 139 CAMPFIRE ROAD NORTH

For twenty (20) years, Jane and I have been waiting for a crowd to come to a Town Board Meeting and now we really have one, so...

*(Unidentified from audience, "Speak up, please.")*

JOHN SCHMITT, 139 CAMPFIRE ROAD NORTH

Okay, I'm sorry. A couple of quick things...

COUNCILMAN PAGE

Name and address. Name and address, please.

COUNCILWOMAN ZINCK

John? John Schmitt, where do you live?

JOHN SCHMITT, 139 CAMPFIRE ROAD NORTH

Oh, John Schmitt, 139 Campfire Road North.

*(Unidentified from audience, "Thank you.")*

JOHN SCHMITT, 139 CAMPFIRE ROAD NORTH

I want to, this may not be the place, but I want to bring up a proposal for a change to the Town Code. In the southern part of the state, much of the stuff from hydrofracking and other mining is being dumped into vacated wells, and any place they can find it. I've gone through our Town Code rather quickly and I can't find where we are protected. And while I know there's particular legal language that should go in there, I think it should say that, "To ban the disposal of any byproduct of a mining activity, whether liquid, solid, or gas," should be part of our Town Code. In working on the five (5) year Comprehensive Land Use Plan, I know we have some vacant wells still around the Town. I mentioned it to Mr. Minotti on Monday, but I wanted to get it noted that on May 21<sup>st</sup>, it was brought before the Town Board. I think action should be taken. It's something that's protecting the future. I'm talking about his grandchildren I'm trying to protect. It's a real, real problem.

COUNCILWOMAN ZINCK

How about mine? *(Laughter)*

JOHN SCHMITT, 139 CAMPFIRE ROAD NORTH

Secondly, money does a lot of talking and right now they're talking about from the biggest companies in this country they're talking about global warming. Can Henrietta do anything about it? Go and search, put in your search engine the word "climate smart communities," and it'll come right up from the New York State Department of, the DEC, and you will get a whole plan and so Rochester, Brighton, Irondequoit, Victor, are all involved in this. It is a program I'm not proposing you do anything with other than the fact to see we may be doing a lot of what they're asking. But I think as the Town Board, you should be following up. There are some things in there that are helping from an environmental way that we should not be ignoring.

COUNCILMAN PAGE

Thank you.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Thank you, John.

COUNCILMAN BREESE

Thank you.

JOHN McFADDEN, 217 CRIMSON BRAMBLE ROAD

My name is John McFadden, 217 Crimson Bramble Road. I grew up in this beautiful Town of Henrietta and I just want to say this, can everybody hear me?

*(Multiple residents in audience, "Yes.")*

JOHN McFADDEN, 217 CRIMSON BRAMBLE ROAD

I just want to say that, first I want to ask a question. Was this position for the Recreation posted? And after it was posted, did anybody in Henrietta apply for it?

SUPERVISOR MOORE

We had over fifty (50) applicants and I'm not sure whether it was, I'd have to ask Barbara, because you screened them? You have to come to the microphone, please.

BARBARA CHIRDO, DIRECTOR OF FINANCE

Yes, there were over fifty (50).

*(Unidentified from audience, "Use the microphone.")*

*(Unidentified from audience, "We can't hear you.")*

BARBARA CHIRDO, DIRECTOR OF FINANCE

Yes, there were over fifty (50). I don't recall off the top of my head how many were from Henrietta. We went by qualifications and that was how they were screened. I don't recall off the top of my head, because it was in the past couple of months.

*(Unidentified from audience, "Where was it posted?")*

BARBARA CHIRDO, DIRECTOR OF FINANCE

It was on CareerBuilder, in the paper, it was on Craigslist, so that's why we got so many responses from CareerBuilder.

JOHN McFADDEN, 217 CRIMSON BRAMBLE ROAD

With that being said, I just want to applaud the person that held that position, who everybody has known and loved and you can call her anytime, and I mean anytime. If you talk to any young person that's coming up from preschool all the way up to high school, it was that person, who not only loved this Town, but loved the children. And number one thing, is that person that you picked or as qualified for is going to love Henrietta like we do and like that person that held that position? God bless you.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Thank you.

*(Applause)*

NANCY SCARBOROUGH, 47 HORSESHOE LANE SOUTH

Nancy Scarborough, 47 Horseshoe Lane South, Henrietta. I have actually three (3) things to say. I came primarily tonight, can you hear me, because I'm kind of...

*(Multiple residents in audience, "Yes.")*

NANCY SCARBOROUGH, 47 HORSESHOE LANE SOUTH

Okay, because of our Abby. I'm so proud of her, those of us on the Youth Board. I remember the day over at West Town Village and we had all these things going on and I looked over and I said, "Abby, help! I need help!" And without, she just went to town and did everything, it's just amazing what, of course you all know that, what kids can do in this Town. But the door opened to two (2) other things since I've been here, because, that I feel that I would like to speak to. Back in the eighties (1980s) in Rush-Henrietta Central School District when I taught there, I was called in to Dr. Raymond Delaney's office, do any of you remember him?

*(Unidentified from audience, "Oh yeah.")*

COUNCILMAN BREESE

Oh yeah.

COUNCILWOMAN ZINCK

Yes.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Very well.

NANCY SCARBOROUGH, 47 HORSESHOE LANE SOUTH

And he asked me if I would become the coordinator of English, because the past coordinator left, got a job, left Town, and they were in a position where English was a problem. There were problems in the areas of English on state testing and so on and I said to him at the time, "Well I like what I do. Why should I want to do this?" And then the carrot he waved in front of me was going back to school. I said, "I'm not certified." And he said, "I'm more interested in who I know can do the job than who might be able to do the job." So they created, with their lawyers, what was called Teacher on Special Assignment, which allowed me for, it was two (2) years, to work, I got a Masters in two (2) years at U of R in Administration while I taught, while I worked, but I was never considered and Administrator. And it was perfectly legal, because believe me, Rush-Henrietta, especially Ray Delaney didn't do anything that wasn't legal. But what I remember was, the point was I know you, I know what your abilities are, this is a big problem, I do not want to take a chance, so it was proven ability. So what I'd like to say to you is I am very disappointed in the Town that, like Gladys said, I love more than I can begin to tell you. When our house burned to the ground, we rebuilt it right back up. We said, "We're not going anyplace." That I don't necessarily believe in my heart, I don't have the facts, that all aspects of how this could've been looked at were looked at. So that's, I'm just making that statement. Second statement is I am, my dog and I are so happy about this dog park, I can't begin to tell you! One of the things that I do love about Henrietta and one of the things is we have excellent dog control. Almost everyone on my street has a dog and they are not running loose, they are kept on leashes or they have those fences that work and sometimes don't work, but it's, dogs don't run free. And I've had an opportunity to

participate out in California, my daughters go to the dog park out there with her and her dog and they're not only for the dogs, but they're very community building locations. People don't go and throw their dogs in there and let them go. They're watching their dogs, they're cleaning up after their dogs, but it's also a community building opportunity. So for that, I thank you. That's all I have to say.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Well, dog parks are actually for the people not for the dogs.

NANCY SCARBOROUGH, 47 HORSESHOE LANE SOUTH

But my dog's looking forward to being able to run for the first time in ten (10) years.

*(Applause)*

ALICIA MANUSE, 109 CAMELOT DRIVE

Finally. My name's Alicia Manuse, I live on 109 Camelot Drive, and I'm not confident that the qualifications that were required for Town Supervisor were fulfilled. I'd like to know what they are. Did it require a degree? And I'd like to know what your education level is, because it's very disappointing here tonight.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Thank you.

ALICIA MANUSE, 109 CAMELOT DRIVE

And I think you owe Karen an apology. So how am I going to find out what the qualifications are?

*(Applause)*

ALICIA MANUSE, 109 CAMELOT DRIVE

And Shelly. Do you have a college degree?

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Yes, ma'am, I do.

ALICIA MANUSE, 109 CAMELOT DRIVE

You have a college degree?

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Yes, ma'am, I do.

ALICIA MANUSE, 109 CAMELOT DRIVE

Four (4) years?

SUPERVISOR MOORE

No, two (2) years.

ALICIA MANUSE, 109 CAMELOT DRIVE

And what's the requirements for Town Supervisor.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

I don't believe there is any.

ALICIA MANUSE, 109 CAMELOT DRIVE

But yet you're going to put that stipulation on the position that Karen was doing.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

But I don't make the civil service requirements, ma'am. I'm trying to adhere by the law.

ALICIA MANUSE, 109 CAMELOT DRIVE

Well maybe we need to revisit what the requirements for Town Supervisor are.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

You're more than welcome to run anytime you want.

ALICIA MANUSE, 109 CAMELOT DRIVE

Well maybe we'll...

*(Applause)*

COMMANDER JACK GRECO, 104 LIPPMAN ROAD

So can everybody hear me?

*(Unidentified from audience, "Oh yeah!")*

COMMANDER JACK GRECO, 104 LIPPMAN ROAD

So my name is Commander Jack Greco, I live at 104 Lippman Road and I've been a resident in Henrietta for I don't know, thirty-six (36) years. So as I look here I feel very comfortable and as I look here, I see a lot of people that don't look very comfortable. Hey folks, we're one drop in the ocean. When I was deployed on twice and I came back looking for a job, with all of my degrees, Master's degree, started my Doctorate study, I could not find a job, and I did apply through civil service. And I could only get the job that I was qualified for. Karen, I salute you. I've heard a lot good about you, but it's the facts. I was thirteen (13) years as an enlisted individual in the Armed Forces. I wanted and prayed to the Lord above to be an Officer. It's not going to happen until I get, Mr. McFadden you know me as an Officer, you know what type of Officer I was. Until I got my degree, it wasn't going to happen. So I applaud following the rules. I don't care what they are. Whatever they are, they're the rules. And you

know what, we've got this pendulum that goes facts and feelings and facts and feelings. So I have to ask some questions for the facts. In one of the Resolutions, there was a surplus supplies for the Henrietta Public Library. It was Resolution #11-141/2014. I'd be interested to find out the list of the surplus and where I can obtain that.

COUNCILWOMAN ZINCK

I can hand you a copy.

COMMANDER JACK GRECO, 104 LIPPMAN ROAD

Beautiful, so if I can get a copy of that, I would like that. And the reason why is I'm involved with youth, the Armed Forces, the Sea Cadets. Mr. McFadden, you remember the Sea Cadets, so I want to help the youth. It's something I can get, I would like to donate, thank you, I'll grab that. The other question I have is we're all residents of Henrietta, so your neighbors says to you, "This isn't working," or, "That isn't working." All we can do is listen to the issue at hand and make sure that the facts, ethics, we should have the Ethics Board, right? Ethics? That ethics are followed, the rules are followed. So the other question I have is a neighbor asked me about River Meadow. The person said, "The parking is unbelievable there." And the response, he said that he's probably, probably a lot of the people that are parking there aren't paying their taxes. I said, "What do you mean? Everybody pays taxes." He says, "They're probably RIT students." I love school, I love RIT, but he says that there's a lot of parking there. So I just said, as a corporate citizen, or as a citizen of Henrietta, that I'd bring it up today. And then the last question I have please is, and I don't know this, I need to be educated, what's the relationship of the Fire Department with the Town? Is there a...? So the Town and...?

COUNCILMAN MULLIGAN

They're governed, Jack, by five (5) independent Commissioners that are elected. It's totally separate from the Town. Back in the 1960s, Supervisor Don Cook got state legislation passed to take the Fire Budget and the Fire District cost away from the Town Board. They created five (5) Commissioners, one of them is Joe Martin. There's a Bill Gilchrist, I can get you the names if you like, and they're elected I think every three (3) years.

COMMANDER JACK GRECO, 104 LIPPMAN ROAD

Okay.

COUNCILMAN PAGE

They levy their own taxes and they're totally separate from the Town.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Not necessarily, we do collect them. We collect them and write them a check.

COUNCILMAN PAGE

Yeah, but they decide on them.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

They set their own rate.

COMMANDER JACK GRECO, 104 LIPPMAN ROAD

I appreciate the feedback. And for those of you who know me, it's Commander Greco.

COUNCILWOMAN ZINCK

And the parking we just addressed at the, I think it was our last meeting.

COUNCILMAN BREESE

Last week.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Yeah, we had a Public Hearing on the River Meadow parking and we set parking limitations.

Hi, good evening, how are you?

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Good.

COUNCILWOMAN ZINCK

Good.

SIMEON BANISTER, 866 SURREY HILL WAY

My name is Simeon Banister, and I live at 866 Surrey Hill Way and I wanted to really just start by first off, my wife and I are from the Rochester area but we recently moved back and so I want to just start first off by thanking this community for welcoming me and my wife and my little boy to Henrietta. We really appreciate it.

*(Applause)*

SIMEON BANISTER, 866 SURREY HILL ROAD

We see a lot of folks here like Nancy, and John, and Gladys, and Dave, and Shelly, and yes, even Karen, who have really welcomed us to this community and we're greatly appreciative. I just want to start by really quickly, and I'll keep it short, but just saying that when I was a little boy, my mother would, I have two (2) brothers, my mother would tell us that we got some chores to do and she'd tell us mow the grass or wash the dishes. And there was always a race between me and my brothers, and the race was always to say who was the supervisor. And we would say, as quickly as possible, one of us would jump up into that role and the reason why we wanted to be in the supervisor role because it meant that we were in charge. It meant that we could tell

the other boys what to do. We wanted to be the supervisor because if one of us had gotten on each other's nerves earlier in the day, it was a chance to get a little payback. Being supervisor was something that was important to us as little boys, but I suppose I'm under the impression that when you grow up and you take on the responsibility of managing a Town like this, that Supervisor means something a little bit different, that it means something a little bit more important than it did to eight (8) year old boys, and that it really is about keeping an eye on the people of this Town and managing this Town in an effective way. When I come to a room like this and I see a lot of the folks that I've gotten a chance to meet so far and a lot of the Town employees are here, our seniors are here, and they complain and raise issues about the fact that this Town is running into those kinds of problems, I find it deeply disturbing, quite frankly, and particularly as a new resident to Henrietta. I've heard a little bit of hiding behind technicalities tonight. There was a technicality about how Karen, who was actually hired, at least as I understand, I just found out by Jim Breese, years and years and years ago, almost thirty-five (35) years ago and has served in the title that she's had for quite some time and a technicality is used to change the system that, I certainly agree with the Commander, we have to follow the rules, no doubt, but we can't manipulate the rules, because that's just not fair and that's not right. A technicality keeps us tonight from talking about what happened to Shelly Gorino in a meaningful way, in a way that is honest and transparent with this community, and that's not fair, that's not right. We can't afford to hide behind these technicalities because the fact of the matter is that our community deserves better than that. We deserve a Supervisor that is not going to act like an eight (8) year old boy and stomp around and tell people what to do, but we deserve a Supervisor that is going to...

*(Applause and cheers)*

SIMEON BANISTER, 866 SURREY HILL ROAD  
...a Supervisor...

*(Applause)*

SIMEON BANISTER, 866 SURREY HILL ROAD  
...that's going to fight on behalf of this Town and its resident to ensure that we get the best services possible and if folks are coming here and saying that someone like Shelly, with her distinguished record and the love that she gets from the seniors that are in the Senior Center, when they say that there's a problem, when folks come because their kids and in some instances like I think John said, he grew up with Karen as the Assistant Director for Recreation in the Town, and the Director and Acting or whatever you guys have. With the technicalities here, the fact of the matter is these are folks that are dedicated public servants and we have to respect them as dedicated public servants.

*(Applause and cheers)*

SIMEON BANISTER, 866 SURREY HILL ROAD

So I've, I figure I probably carried on a little too long, but I think it is appropriate, like the seniors said, to give Shelly an apology, to restore her wages. I think it is appropriate to, at the very least, give Karen some kind of decent explanation. I think it's appropriate to deal with the mountain of violations and grievances that have been filed. And I think it's appropriate to deal with this Town in an open and transparent way. Dispose of the technicalities and let's get down to taking care of the people.

*(Applause)*

MIKE STAFFORD, 32 ESSEX DRIVE

Mike Stafford, 32 Essex Drive. Just want to make a follow up comment on what he just said. I'm kind of concerned also, I've heard a lot about grievances being filed by the employees of Henrietta. I'm kind of worried about the legal cost. I know dealing with labor every day of my life that the legal costs for either side can add up quite a bit and I believe these, I'm very concerned the legal costs that are going to be involved fighting with our workers, and the morale of our workers.

*(Applause)*

MIKE STAFFORD, 32 ESSEX DRIVE

So that also brings me on to another topic. Since I've been attending the meetings since January, I've noticed, and I'll just use the Highway Department for an example, you hire a lot of, I believe they're seasonal or part-time people. And I've noticed their wages run between eight dollars (\$8.00) and fourteen dollars (\$14.00), the one that was approved last week or last two (2) weeks ago for fourteen dollars (\$14.00) an hour. And first thing, I think eight dollars (\$8.00) an hour is just a ridiculously low rate. It's not a fair wage, it's not, you know eight dollars (\$8.00) is not, is just minimum wage, and it's just a ridiculous rate. But I'd like to know who decides that one guy's going to get fourteen dollars (\$14.00) an hour and one guy's going to get eight dollars (\$8.00) an hour. I don't want to see anybody, I'm not saying the guy making, believe me, I'm not saying the guy that makes fourteen dollars (\$14.00) an hour is making too much, he's making a fair rate. And I'd just like to know what that eight dollar (\$8.00) an hour guy isn't doing to get the fourteen dollars (\$14.00) an hour.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Depends on the seasonal and the recommendations are from the Department Heads to start with and most of the eight dollar (\$8.00) people are either high school or college kids that are coming home from the summer.

MIKE STAFFORD, 32 ESSEX DRIVE

Okay, it's my understanding that they're doing the same thing as the person that's making fourteen dollars (\$14.00) an hour.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

I'm not sure, but I understood that the fourteen dollar (\$14.00) an hour fellow was running some crews and that had a lot of experience and he was forty (40) some odd years old.

MIKE STAFFORD, 32 ESSEX DRIVE

Well, I mean do you base, are you basing the wage on their age? I mean fourteen (14), forty (40) years old...

SUPERVISOR MOORE

No, for experience and that he was running some crews.

MIKE STAFFORD, 32 ESSEX DRIVE

Okay.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Whereas, I don't think a high schooler or a college person is going to run a crew.

MIKE STAFFORD, 32 ESSEX DRIVE

Okay. I just, I also believe you get, you get what you pay for. And eight dollar (\$8.00) an hour people are not usually as dedicated as somebody who's making a fair wage.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Well what we're trying to do though is we're trying to give kids in our community a job and so we make preference for Henrietta high school and college kids.

MIKE STAFFORD, 32 ESSEX DRIVE

Okay.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

So if you don't want us to do that, then please...

MIKE STAFFORD, 32 ESSEX DRIVE

No, I, and I commend you for, and that was my next question.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

If you look at most of our seasonals...

MIKE STAFFORD, 32 ESSEX DRIVE

Right.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

They're Henrietta people.

MIKE STAFFORD, 32 ESSEX DRIVE

Okay, that was my next question. Are they...?

SUPERVISOR MOORE

In fact we just hired a lady in the Clerk's office part-time...

MIKE STAFFORD, 32 ESSEX DRIVE

Right.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

...and one of the requirements that I asked for was make sure they're from Henrietta. We had over seventy (70) applicants for a twelve dollar (\$12.00) an hour job.

MIKE STAFFORD, 32 ESSEX DRIVE

Right. And I...

SUPERVISOR MOORE

And we interviewed, I think they interviewed thirty (30) people.

MIKE STAFFORD, 32 ESSEX DRIVE

Okay.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

And they were primarily all from Henrietta.

MIKE STAFFORD, 32 ESSEX DRIVE

Okay. I am happy to hear that they're, you know you're taking the youth from Henrietta and giving them some opportunities.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Well I don't know if maybe you want me to do something different.

MIKE STAFFORD, 32 ESSEX DRIVE

Nope, I didn't, no I didn't say that. I'm just asking why, who decides what they make. You notice, like I said, you go through the Minutes and you can see there are a wide range of wages from eight dollars (\$8.00) an hour to fourteen dollars (\$14.00) an hour.

COUNCILMAN BREESE

Sometimes that conversation, you'll hear that perhaps at our Workshops when we see wages come in. Typically it's exactly what the Supervisor said, it's the recommendation of the Department Head or whoever's hiring and staffing that area.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

And they're also the ones that interview them. So they have a better feel for what the aptitude they have for the job is and an entry level job, I would tell you in our

community is eight twenty-five (\$8.25).

MIKE STAFFORD, 32 ESSEX DRIVE  
It's, pardon me?

SUPERVISOR MOORE  
An entry level job in our community is eight twenty-five (\$8.25).

MIKE STAFFORD, 32 ESSEX DRIVE  
Okay.

COUNCILWOMAN ZINCK  
Yeah, some of the things you're seeing too are employees reaching certain steps, which take them to the next level.

SUPERVISOR MOORE  
But not necessarily for seasonals.

COUNCILWOMAN ZINCK  
Right.

SUPERVISOR MOORE  
A lot of it's experience and we have the Youngman family here, for example, two (2) of the family members work in Highway and we've employed their kids for I don't know, six (6), seven (7) years and every year they get an increase.

MIKE STAFFORD, 32 ESSEX DRIVE  
Okay.

SUPERVISOR MOORE  
I mean...

MIKE STAFFORD, 32 ESSEX DRIVE  
Like I said, I just, I'm, I see...

SUPERVISOR MOORE  
I know, but if you're going to come up here and find fault, you have to...

MIKE STAFFORD, 32 ESSEX DRIVE  
I didn't, I'm just asking questions, I'm asking...

SUPERVISOR MOORE  
You have to be fair if you expect me to be fair.

MIKE STAFFORD, 32 ESSEX DRIVE

I'm asking questions on how it was determined and you told me. I don't see, I just see that there's a wide range for doing the same, for the same job.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Well I employ quite a few people at my own establishment and I employ a lot of young people and they'll start between eight and nine dollars (\$8.00 - \$9.00) an hour, but I also have some twenty dollar (\$20.00) an hour employees...

MIKE STAFFORD, 32 ESSEX DRIVE

Right.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

...that are part-time.

MIKE STAFFORD, 32 ESSEX DRIVE

Okay.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

It all depends on their experience.

MIKE STAFFORD, 32 ESSEX DRIVE

Okay. So...

ALICIA MANUSE, 109 CAMELOT DRIVE

To add to that, so how come an employee, I believe his name is Bob Tobey, is making twelve dollars (\$12.00) an hour and he has an abundance of knowledge, he's worked here for many years and then you have a new person coming in making fourteen dollars (\$14.00)? How do you justify that?

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Mr. Tobey is a retiree from the Highway Department and was looking for a part-time job. But I don't think the Union wants him taking away Union jobs, so he came in at a twelve dollar (\$12.00) an hour fee and that's what Bob asked me for.

ALICIA MANUSE, 109 CAMELOT DRIVE

But your answer then that you're giving to him, to his question, is not uniform.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Well...

ALICIA MANUSE, 109 CAMELOT DRIVE

It's at your discretion. You're saying you're basing it on their experience, right? You said it's based on their experience.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Correct. But when Mr. Tobey came to see me and asked for a job, he explicitly said that he didn't want any more than twelve dollars (\$12.00) an hour.

*(Laughter)*

MIKE STAFFORD, 32 ESSEX DRIVE

I don't know Mr. Tobey.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

And he's collecting the New York State Retirement, so he's limited on what he can make anyway. I mean this man being in the Union should, being in the Union, sir, should know that.

MIKE STAFFORD, 32 ESSEX DRIVE

I'm not even, I don't even know who Mr. Tobey is.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Well, Mr. Tobey and I went to kindergarten...

MIKE STAFFORD, 32 ESSEX DRIVE

No, when you say...

SUPERVISOR MOORE

...together, went to grammar school together...

MIKE STAFFORD, 32 ESSEX DRIVE

No, when you say, but you say I should know that. I don't, I wasn't even, wasn't even referring to any retired people. I was just referring to I noticed when you're approving peoples' wages, that there's an...

SUPERVISOR MOORE

And as a Town Supervisor, I don't believe that somebody comes in and says he wants to work for twelve dollars (\$12.00) an hour, I should say, "Oh, no, you have to make more money."

MIKE STAFFORD, 32 ESSEX DRIVE

That's why I'm asking. I never...

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Money doesn't grow on trees.

MIKE STAFFORD, 32 ESSEX DRIVE

I never said it did, I just, I just like making sure that, I like fair wages for a fair day's work and...

COUNCILMAN BREESE

Just one request as we go down this path continually that when we're discussing things of that sort, we don't preface it with who it is.

MIKE STAFFORD, 32 ESSEX DRIVE

I didn't bring up any names.

COUNCILMAN BREESE

I'm just saying...

MIKE STAFFORD, 32 ESSEX DRIVE

I did not bring up any names, make that clear. I never said anybody's name and I never...

COUNCILMAN BREESE

Yeah, it's just not something we really want to be doing, but I think you have the situation that he described happens in private business all the time. I know where I am we have people that they can't exceed certain hours specifically for that reason.

MIKE STAFFORD, 32 ESSEX DRIVE

Right.

COUNCILMAN BREESE

They're retirees and there's a dollar figure that they have to stay within and if they're willing to work and they want to be there for fifteen (15) hours, then the number that they come up with is whatever they're maxing out at.

MIKE STAFFORD, 32 ESSEX DRIVE

Right.

COUNCILMAN BREESE

So that's kind of unique, but it does happen throughout the industries.

MIKE STAFFORD, 32 ESSEX DRIVE

I realize that, yeah, and I realize there's limits on how much retirees can make. I'm also, I've also always believed in equal work, equal pay.

COUNCILMAN BREESE

Well that's understandable.

MIKE STAFFORD, 32 ESSEX DRIVE

If you're doing basically the same job...

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Mike...

MIKE STAFFORD, 32 ESSEX DRIVE

Yes.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

I think we have other people wanting to talk.

MIKE STAFFORD, 32 ESSEX DRIVE

Okay I'm sorry.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Thank you.

MIKE STAFFORD, 32 ESSEX DRIVE

Thank you.

CRAIG ROBERT MOFFETT, 81 FINNEGAN WAY

Hi, Craig Robert Moffett, 81 Finnegan Way, Craig Robert Moffett, 81 Finnegan Way. It's a tough job, isn't it.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

It's easier here than it was someplace else.

CRAIG ROBERT MOFFETT, 81 FINNEGAN WAY

It's not easy being up there, is it? No, it's not. It's a difficult job and I just wanted to say that I think Henrietta is a wonderful place and I think that it's a tough job and you do the best you can and then you move on. And I want to thank you for the Lookup Park and I also wanted to suggest to the gentleman that's having issues with renters that there's a law, which I had experience with and I worked with the Rochester Police Department and the Department of Social Services and it's called a Real Property Law. That's your avenue. You use that and then you go after the landlord, that's my advice. Thank you.

Thank you.

CRAIG ROBERT MOFFETT, 81 FINNEGAN WAY

Good job.

*(Applause)*

ALICIA MANUSE, 109 CAMELOT DRIVE

On behalf of Gladys...

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Ma'am, you have to state your name and your address, please.

ALICIA MANUSE, 109 CAMELOT DRIVE

You forgot it already?

*(Laughter and applause)*

SUPERVISOR MOORE

No, it's for the Record.

ALICIA MANUSE, 109 CAMELOT DRIVE

This is on behalf of Gladys. She would like to know why there were no tractors in the Memorial Day Parade.

*(Applause)*

SUPERVISOR MOORE

You're talking about Town equipment?

ALICIA MANUSE, 109 CAMELOT DRIVE

Yes.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Well we spent quite a bit of overtime last year on the Memorial Day Parade and we had a Clean Sweep that we did on Saturday, so what I did was I took the money that we would've spent for Town employees driving in the parade and had them participate and take three hundred and twenty (320) people in our Town parks and in our communities and clean them up. And I thought spending the money on the Clean Sweep would have been probably money better spent than having Town equipment in the parade. But I did ask the Town employees if they would like to come and drive a piece of equipment and not get paid.

ALICIA MANUSE, 109 CAMELOT DRIVE

Volunteer?

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Yes. Because like the Volunteer Fire Department, I don't believe those guys get paid and it's a community event and I was hoping that the employees had enough pride in their community and of the equipment that they have and job that they would feel good enough to do that.

ALICIA MANUSE, 109 CAMELOT DRIVE

How'd that go, the Clean Sweep?

SUPERVISOR MOORE

The Clean Sweep went real good. They did a great job, the people did, and the employees did a great job doing it.

ALICIA MANUSE, 109 CAMELOT DRIVE

Did you do it?

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Did I do it? I was here about 8:00 in the morning and everybody left and I came back about 11:00, 11:30 and stayed until 12:30. Was I out picking up stuff?

The cut through? Yeah, takes you to East Henrietta Road.

SUPERVISOR MOORE

Well, they cleaned all the brush out of that, they totally painted the whole thing, got rid of all the graffiti. They went to Lookup Park and dragged out brush to be chipped. They worked in Memorial Park and our Parks people did an excellent job. I sent Tim Ochs a thank you note yesterday thanking him and his staff for the job they did. They worked on the Genesee Valley, or the trail and did a nice job cleaning that up. It was a cooperation between our employees leading the volunteers and I thought they did a great job.

ALICIA MANUSE, 109 CAMELOT DRIVE

But you're trying to insinuate that your staff employees don't have Town pride because

you didn't want to pay them, you wanted them to volunteer, right?

SUPERVISOR MOORE

I didn't insinuate that, I said that I thought that the money would be better spent working on the Clean Sweep so that the community could be cleaned up and improved. And if the employees wanted to volunteer, that was up to them, but it was nowhere near was it mandatory or did I take down names, no. It didn't make any difference to me. I really can't figure out how a Town truck has anything to do with a veteran.

Yeah, we'll let Linus come up.

Ruth Turk, 21 Timberline Drive, West Henrietta, New York. I've known you since you were, anyway, my husband taught you at McQuaid. You were a poor student then too. The comment that I want to make though is that you're figuring out who can work for nothing and how your employees can work to the best of their ability when you keep cutting back their hours. You have a full time employee and then you tell them they can't work more than twenty-eight (28) hours a week. Now I don't think that's fair at all. First of all, we're not getting the services that we need accordingly. And then, if you hire somebody, you tell them okay, you're qualified to do this job, but you can only do it for so long. **TOWN OF HENRIETTA**  
**Petty Cash Policy**

The Petty Cash Account is established to reimburse employees for minor expenses (\$20 or less) that are either incurred or purchased for official Town business. Petty cash is a sum of money set aside for minor disbursements for which the issuance of a formal voucher would be impractical.

Employees may request reimbursement for items up to \$20.00 from the Petty Cash Account for items purchased or expenses incurred for official business of the Town of Henrietta. Incidental expenses allowed through petty cash are: Registered mail, postage, emergency supplies, tolls, parking fees, etc. The Petty Cash Account may not be used for personal cash advances even if secured by check or other I.O.U. Likewise, petty cash cannot be used for reimbursable business expenses such as meals or travel arrangements.

The Town has established Petty Cash Accounts for the following offices in the designated amounts:

Town Clerk	\$300.00
Receiver of Taxes	\$200.00
Finance Office	\$225.00
Library	\$385.00
Justices	\$225.00

**Procedures:**

A. An employee is eligible to receive reimbursement for an official Town purchase or expense (\$20.00 or less) after furnishing an original, itemized, dated receipt to the appropriate Department Head/petty cash custodian.

B. In special circumstances when a receipt is not available, reimbursement from the petty cash funds for expenses incurred may be approved by the Finance Director.

C. Cash advances are not allowed. However, mitigating circumstances may arise when the Supervisor may choose to approve the release of petty cash for official Town business before the expense has been incurred (e.g., coin-operated car wash, registration cost for local one-day business meeting).

D. The Department Head/petty cash custodian will verify the information on the receipt against the requested amount of cash before fulfilling the reimbursement request. The recipient will sign the petty cash log to confirm receipt.

E. On a quarterly basis, the Department Head/petty cash custodian will reconcile the account to verify that remaining cash plus attached receipts equal the authorized petty cash amount. Another employee will confirm the reconciliation.

F. After the reconciliation, the Department Head will submit the receipts to the Director of Finance. A check will be issued for the amount of cash needed to replenish the fund to its authorized amount. The check will be made payable to "Petty Cash Custodian" and be cashed by the recipient. Immediately after cashing the check, the custodian will replenish the petty cash fund.

G. The Supervisor or designee will conduct periodic petty cash audits to ensure proper management of the fund.
